Concolor (7-14"): Grows to 100 feet. Ashy gray trunk and soft silvery blue foliage. Flat needles are 1½ to 2 long. Excellent for Christmas tree and ornamental use. Best needle retention of short needled trees and has pleasant citrus aroma. Withstands heat and drought better than other firs and grows best in well drained soils.

Fraser Fir (7-14"): Grows to 60 feet. Very soft, shiny, dark green foliage is silver on underside. Needs only light shearing. Excellent for Christmas tree use, with good needle retention. Cool, moist well drained soil. Full sun not required.

Eastern White Pine (10-20"): Fast growing to 100 feet. A five needled pine, with soft, 4 inch light green-blue needles. Makes an excellent ornamental, as well as Christmas or timber tree. Responds well to shearing. Does well in ordinary soils.

Norway Spruce (10-24"): Grows to 75 feet. Dense, 1 inch dark green needles. Valued as an ornamental and timber tree. One of the best conifers for shelters and windbreaks, due to dense branching. Does well in average soil, but prefers moisture.

Scotch Pine (15-30"): Grows to 50 feet. Rigid, blue green needles are 1½ to 3½ inches long. Vigorous and hardy. Popular for Christmas tree, as well as ornamental and windbreak uses. Adjusts well to dry areas. Orange, peeling bark provides visual accents.

BACKYARD HABITAT ENHANCERS

Pin Oak (10-24"): Native tree with fast growth to 75 feet in good soil. Excellent lawn tree. Acorns are good wildlife food. Tolerates wet soils, but prefers moist rich, acidic, well drained soil.

Red Oak (12-28"): Fast growth to 60-70 feet with equal spread. Best in sandy to rich loamy soil in full sun.

American Cranberry (30-50"): Grows to 12 feet tall and 8 feet wide. White flowers in spring followed by red berries in fall and winter. Excellent food source for birds. A good screening plant when planted 4 feet apart. Full to part sun.

Grey Dogwood (10-24"): Grows to 15 feet. Very dense green foliage that turns purple in the fall. Numerous small white flower clusters bloom in mid June, giving way to small white berries. Grows well in average conditions.

Silky Dogwood (10-20"): Grows to 9 feet. Dense foliage turns red in fall. Small clusters of yellowish-white flowers in late May, followed by blue or grayish berries in fall. Bark is scarlet red in color all winter. Berries attract birds. Full to part sun.

Tree Shelter (24" or 48"): A blue plastic sheet that is placed in a plastic sleeve to form a 24 or 48 inch tall tube. Protects seedlings from wildlife damage. Increases survival rate and growth. Not recommended for evergreens. Requires a stake.

Northeast Perennial and Annual Wildflower Mix: This is a beautiful all-purpose wildflower mix, containing about 1/3 annual wildflowers for first year color, and 2/3 perennials for color the following years. This is a mix of native and naturalized species. Seed at 1 oz/125 sq. ft., 8oz/1,000 sq. ft in sunny location.

Bluebird Box: Feature an overhang roof, bottom slots for drainage, recessed bottom to prevent rain seepage, and an easy open front for monitoring and cleaning. Attach boxes 4 to 6 feet high on a post facing the nearest tree or shrub, and space boxes at least 100 yards apart. Boxes made by West Perry FFA students.

Orders are subject to availability. All seedlings must be purchased by placing a prepaid order. If any one species is sold out, the District will refund payment for those seedlings not available. The survival rate of bare root seedlings varies from site to site, from excellent to poor. We strive to provide the most viable seedlings available, and all efforts are made to handle seedlings in a manner that prevents root stress. The Perry Conservation District will not insure successful plantings of bare root seedlings, just as our suppliers will not insure seedling survival. The District is not responsible for orders not picked up by 6:00 pm on April 8, 2010.
